National Recognition for Community Impact

Congratulations to Sharon Morrison, Sudha Shreeniwas, Andrew Montagnard Young and the Association/Montagnard American Organization for work the Montagnard/Southeast Asian Community Disparities Research Network which received the inaugural Community Impact and Outcomes Award given by the International Association for Research on Service-Learning and Community Engagement. This award recognizes service-learning and research carried out in partnership with communities to address the priorities of community stakeholders, which are guided by principles of reciprocity, mutual respect, shared authority, and cocreation, and which have produced measurable and sustained impact.



Cohort 3: Community Engaged Pathways and Partnerships (P2) Grant: A Collective Scholarship Fellows Program

The Community-Engaged Pathways and Partnerships Scholarship Fellows program strengthen collective approaches to community-engaged scholarship through the development of sustainable pathways and partnerships that build deep, reciprocal processes to achieve mutually beneficial, communityidentified priorities. In 2020, a third cohort of grant teams will begin the three-year fellows program. One team will focus on integrating social workers into the public libraries with partners from Greensboro Public Library, High Point Public Library, Library Information Sciences, and the Joint Master of Social Work Program including faculty from UNCG and NC A&T. Another team will be fostering relationships between the School of Art and the Industries of the Blind through a public art project. See a full list of grant team members here.

Arts, Humanities, and Design in Public Life: A Visit from Imagining America

Institute of Community and Economic Engagement is hosting two special events featuring Erica Kohl-Arenas and Mina Para Matlon from Imagining America January 22-23rd. Imagining America is an association that supports the arts, humanities, and design in public life. The first event is titled "Creative Culture as a Site of Liberation: Exploring the Messiness of Public Work in the Arts, Design, and Humanities," a dialogue on community knowledge making and tapping into the power of public imagination. Sharing UNCG Scholarship and Leadership

Center for Housing and Community Studies' Tenant Leadership Academy

The Tenant Leadership Academy is a training program for tenant organizers. CHCS recruits tenants from low-income apartment communities in Greensboro. Tenants are invited to participate in twelve to eighteen workshops in six sessions held over a twelve-week period, covering topics that include tenant rights and obligations, access to resources, history of housing and spatial disparities in housing quality, development of leadership skills and a series of workshops on creating and implementing a tenant association. Participants are paid \$250 for approximately 25 hours' work. Graduates become members of a network of organizers who share ideas and collaborate on initiatives to improve conditions, promote collective action and advocate on housing-related policy issues.

Well Crafted NC was featured on WUNC's "The State of Things" on Tuesday, January 14th for "The History of Beer in North Carolina." Well Crafted NC (with representatives from University Libraries), along with partners from the Triad Brewers Alliance, The Beer Law Center, and UNCG's Department of Marketing, Entrepreneurship, Hospitality, and Tourism are working to document and publicize the history of beer in North Carolina with support from ICEE's Community Engagement Pathways and Partnerships Grant.

ICEE Community Engagement Fellows bring together faculty, staff, administrators, students, and community members to advance community engagement at UNC

Community Engagement Writing Group

The Community Engagement Writing Group aims to community-engaged scholars connect to explore opportunities and challenges related to writing for scholarly publication through collaborating, networking, and supporting each other's ideas. The Community Engagement Writing Group began meeting weekly during the Fall 2018 semester. The group will continue to meet weekly. Over the next year, we aim to explore strategies to support community engagement and writing, build alliances with similar groups on campus, and build a community of practice around writing and community engagement.



Be Here Club

The Be Here Club (BHC) is an informal monthly social/networking gathering intended to make the larger UNCG Community little smaller. Academic professionals, including faculty, administrators, and staff, often operate in insulated channels with diverse responsibilities, therefore communal socialization, integration, making partnerships challenging. BHC is also a forum to encourage engagement with community members and partners from outside of UNCG to add to the aesthetic of Greensboro and create real opportunities for societal improvement on a local level. Above all else, the BHC is simply a place to find and build camaraderie and comfort for those who call UNCG and Greensboro home.

2020 PACE Conference
